## **1. Introduction**

The United States, Federal Aviation Administration, is pleased to host the next ATNP Working Groups Meeting at the Ala Moana Hotel in Honolulu, Hawaii from 18-29 January, 1999.

## **2. Meeting Information**

#### **4. Access to Honolulu and the Ala Moana Hotel**

Driving: Upon leaving the airport, follow the signs which indicate “Waikiki”. You will go up an elevated roadway to enter H1 Freeway, which will become Nimitz Highway. Continue on Nimitz which will become Ala Moana Boulevard. A few landmarks along the way will be the Aloha Tower (on the right), the IBM Building (not very tall, on the left), and the Ala Moana Shopping Center (on the left). After passing the cross-street of Piikoi street, move to your left lane to be able to turn left on to Atkinson Drive. The hotel is on the left side of Atkinson Drive.

There are four restaurants in the hotel including a Coffee Shop, a Chinese, a Japanese, and a Fine Dining restaurant. In addition, there are plenty of restaurants within walking distance of the hotel. Further information will be provided at the meeting.

Taxi to the hotel will cost approximately US\$ 25.00

## **6. General Information About Hawaii**

Hawaii (he-wä'ê), is the 50<sup>th</sup> state of the US. It is composed of a group of eight major islands and numerous islands and inlets in the central Pacific Ocean.

Iolani Palace, in downtown Honolulu, is the only royal palace in the U.S. and the official residence of Hawaii's last two monarchs, King Kalakaua and Queen Liliuokalani, displays lavish turn-of-the-century art and furnishings.

The most famous landmark, Diamond Head, peaks at 720 feet and provides a spectacular view of Honolulu. Surfing is synonymous with the island's North Shore. Winter swells create the monstrous waves that draw the world's best surfers each winter.
